It is my pleasure to present the 2018 Annual Report. There are a lot of moving parts to the Annual Report. I would be remiss if I did not mention the staff and their role in achieving excellence in policing and keeping the community safe. We continue to strive with proactive initiatives and community involvement. Interaction and engagement are the keys to success in awareness and education.

The Police Service introduced its three year Business Plan for 2018 – 2020. In that plan, we continue to focus on crime prevention and providing assistance to victims and our vulnerable. The Service went live with the Health IM software system helping officers deal with persons in mental crisis and getting them the referrals and care they require. We continue to be active with our social media keeping the community aware of scams and programs that keep them from becoming victims.

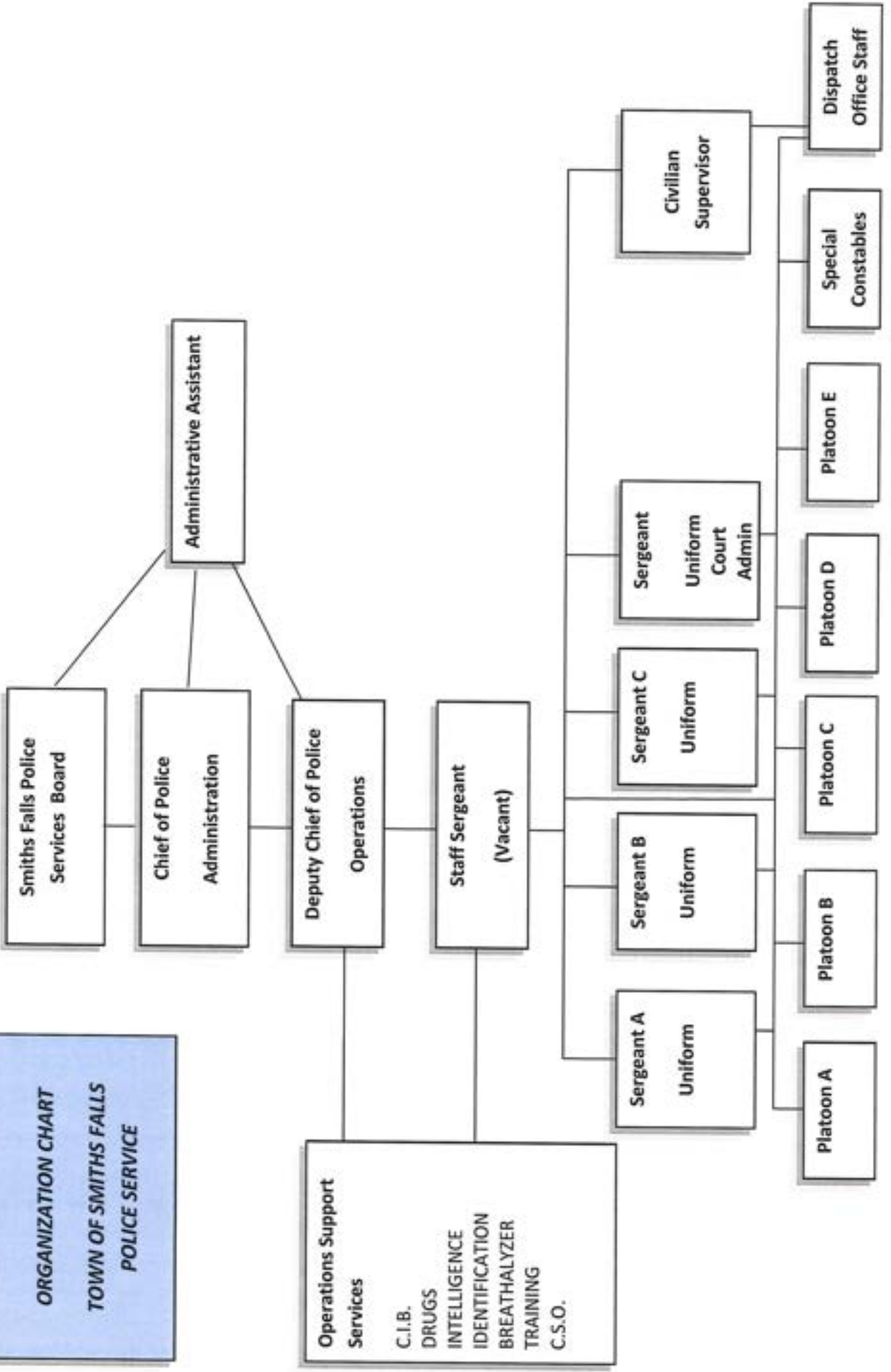

FIREARMS TRAINING

The Smiths Falls Police Service is currently utilizing the Glock Model 17 semi-automatic pistol chambered in 9mm along with the Remington 12ga Shotgun and Colt C8 Carbine Rifle in 223 caliber.

The year 2018 brought about changes in the Firearms Training / Requalification / Refresher for the Smiths Falls Police Service. The Smiths Falls Police Service joined forces with the members of the Brockville Police Service and Gananoque Police Service for the pistol portion. This training was conducted by all three Police Services in house instructors including Sergeant Paul Klassen and Constable David Murphy at an indoor facility. The shotgun and Carbine training / refresher was conducted at an outdoor facility at the Smiths Falls Fish and Game Club.

This training utilized conditions of low light, no light and police strobe lighting conditions along with some close quarter and distance shooting. Officers may encounter these conditions in the line of duty. It also allowed officers to move and shoot from these varying distances using different cover, concealment and platforms for shooting.

The firearms training is consistent with the Ministry Standards. The training is conducted in concert with our Use of Force training and other mandated training requirements.

A police officer can only draw and/or discharge his/her firearm in certain situations and must be justified by law to do so. There is a large amount of emphasis put on safety and judgement during training.

It is with great pride to announce that all of the officers who attended have successfully completed the 2018 Smiths Falls Police Service pistol, shotgun and rifle requalification.

USE OF FORCE TRAINING

The 2018 Use of Force refresher program was undertaken as a collaborative effort with the Brockville and Gananoque Police Services combining resources and instructor cadres and conducting the training at the Reticle Training Centre in Tincap, Ontario. This provided the officers enhanced training utilizing a multi station configuration that allowed the officers to rotate through the program with greater efficiency and allowing for more training time and an expanded curriculum. Court Officers were able to conduct judgement based training in the Brockville Court House thereby allowing training in the forum similar to where they conduct their daily duties.

Immediate Action Rapid Deployment training was also conducted with Brockville and Gananoque Police Services in the Brockville area. The benefit of our officers training with members of other services was immediately evident with enhanced inter-agency cooperation. Officers worked in mixed teams and it provided for a realistic scenario for how an incident of this nature could unfold in our community. An incident of such a scope would certainly require the use of officers from other agencies.

Sergeant Klassen attended the Ontario Police College in May of 2001 and successfully completed training necessary to receive his designation from the Province as a Use of Force/Firearms Instructor.

Constable Murphy attended the Ontario Police College in April of 2005 to receive his Use of Force/Firearms Instructor designation. Constable Murphy has also been trained in Immediate Action–Rapid Deployment (IARD) training, which deals with response to persons actively trying to harm others.

Both Instructors are also qualified instructors in the Taser X26 Electronic Control Device and have been qualified in the Taser X26P and X2 Devices that have been approved for use by Ontario police agencies.

The purpose of the annual Use of Force refresher training is to ensure that all members of the Service have maintained proficiency in all levels of Police Use of Force. In concert with the Firearms training, officers are subjected to individual drills used to show competency in judgment, discretion and use of all Use of Force options, including de-escalation of conflicts. Reality based scenarios also assist in evaluating officer's ability to correctly assess and respond to a wide ranging cross section of events.

The training is completed in line with Provincial Standards and in keeping with the Ontario Police Use of Force Model.

All of our front line members are trained and qualified in the use and deployment of the Taser Electronic Control Device. Patrol Officers are trained and qualified in the use of the Taser X2, and Front Line Supervisors and Specialty Units are trained in the Taser X26, allowing maximum deployment of these devices for emergency responses. In 2019 it is anticipated that all members will transition to the use of the Taser X2 ECD as the Taser X26 has been phased out of production and is no longer being supported.

All Smiths Falls Police Service members attended and successfully completed their annual training in Use of Force.

USE OF FORCE

STATISTICS

OVERVIEW

Use of Force reports are completed whenever an officer attends a call for service that requires officers to employ a physical method to subdue a subject, protect their person and / or the public as well as to effect an arrest. The type of force used is at the discretion of the officer involved based on constant evaluation of the circumstances presented. Officers undergo mandatory yearly firearms and use of force training. The following information was gathered through the reports submitted by the involved officers.

USE OF FORCE REPORTS BY TYPE

When an officer is required to use force the officer must submit a report. This may result in more than one report for the occurrence based on the number of officers who attended the call for service and their involvement. The total number of occurrences requiring a Use of Force Report in 2018 was 23 which resulted in the submission of 31 individual reports.

BREATHALYZER / INTOXILYZER PROGRAM

The prevention and apprehension of Impaired Drivers is a key function for officers on patrol of the Smiths Falls Police Service. The Smiths Falls Police has provided its staff with modern Breath Testing Equipment consisting of an Intoxilyzer 8000C approved breath testing instrument and two Drager Alcotest 6810 approved screening devices are available for patrol officers to conduct roadside alcohol screening tests. The Breath Testing room is equipped with digital video/audio recording equipment to ensure that the best evidence possible is presented to the courts.

The Smiths Falls Police Service currently has four constables and one sergeant trained in the operation of the Intoxilyzer 8000C. As well, all front line officers are trained in the use of the Drager Alcotest 6810 approved screening devices. Starting in 2016, the Smiths Falls Police Service began training officers in Standardized Field Sobriety Testing. In 2018 almost 2/3 of the Service had received this training. In 2018 Sergeant Klassen was sent on an intensive 3 week training program in Ottawa, Ontario and Phoenix, Arizona and has successfully been certified as a Drug Recognition Expert, qualified to conduct assessments of persons believed to be impaired by the use of drugs.

2018 saw many changes and challenges for impaired driving enforcement including the legalization of Cannabis and the complete modernization of all sections related to driving in the Criminal Code. Officers have received continued updates and education in these areas and are completely up to date with their training.

Sergeant Klassen is trained and certified as an Intoxilyzer 8000C Field Coordinator, which qualifies him to conduct Annual Refresher training for Qualified Technicians.

COMMUNICATIONS CENTRE

The Smiths Falls Police Service operates its own Communications Centre. With the facility open to the public 24/7, Civilian Clerk Dispatchers are able to deal with people who walk in to make a report to the police. Dispatchers receive all 911 emergency calls as well as calls that come in on our non-emergency lines.

Our Communications Centre dealt with just over 7900 calls for service. This includes answering the calls, gathering all of the pertinent information and dispatching the officers when required. Providing accurate and relevant information is crucial to officer and public safety. Our dispatchers provide a great deal of clerical support to the officers after the calls are completed. Completing paper work and court related documents assists in ensuring the officers are able to return to their proactive patrols.

TECHNOLOGY

Information Technology Services is a very important part of policing. Ensuring the police services computers, servers, software and security systems are all managed properly and kept current to the latest viruses and system attacks.

IT is also responsible for all of our radio systems, communications equipment, backup systems, phones and police vehicle systems.

RIDE ANNUAL REPORT

The Smiths Falls Police Service RIDE program continued with its activities throughout 2018. The RIDE program is just one element in the Smiths Falls Police Service's ongoing efforts to combat impaired driving. In addition, the legalization of cannabis became effective October 17, 2018 and officers were particularly vigilant with regard to driving under the influence of cannabis.

The Provincial grant received for the 2018-2019 program totaled \$8840.00. As a result the police service was able to conduct a total of 7 dedicated RIDE spot checks. The scheduling and staffing of the RIDE dates was supervised by Sergeant Klassen and occurred during the approach to the traditional Christmas holiday season.

In all 2,567 vehicles were checked. Two roadside alcohol screening device tests were administered and one 3 day licence suspension was issued. No alcohol or drug related criminal driving charges were laid, however, 5 Highway Traffic Act charges and one Liquor Licence Act charge were laid.

VEHICLE FLEET

There are currently nine vehicles in the fleet of the Smiths Falls Police Service. Four of these vehicles are fully marked general patrol vehicles, one is an unmarked clean roof traffic enforcement vehicle, one is a criminal investigation vehicle and one is a criminal investigation/administration vehicle. The majority of the fleet is a mixture of Ford Police Utilities and Ford Taurus's. The Service, as outlined in previous reports, has used studies conducted across Canada to make the Ford Police Utility its vehicle of choice for front line policing. The Ford Police Interceptor Sedan (Taurus) is no longer available. The Service decommissioned two vehicles in 2018 and took a third vehicle off the road in the fall of 2018 due to the high cost of repairs to maintain its safety. This was in anticipation of replacement in 2019. The overall fleet has been reduced by one vehicle. The Service is deferring the purchase of a fully marked police vehicle for 2019. PROPERTY

The Smiths Falls Police Service has assigned dedicated property officers to oversee and manage the property stores. The property items include exhibits that have been seized, found and surrendered by police and the public. The property officers ensure the property items are managed in a way to provide continuity for court purposes. Property that can be returned has been returned to their rightful owners.

In 2018, the following activities were overseen by the officers who manage the property and evidence of the Smiths Falls Police Service.

Police Auction - On June 21, 2018 we hosted a Police auction to the public. The auction was conducted by William Joynt of Joynt Auctions. A total of 43 items were sold at this year's auction and an additional 100 items were purged from our property storage room. The items sold at auction are unclaimed, found property or recovered stolen property where the owner is not identified. A total of \$9932.90 was raised from the auction after expenses.

Controlled Drugs and Substances - All Controlled Drugs and Substances that have come into the possession of the Police Service have been properly tracked and accounted for. Any of these exhibits that require analysis for court purposes, are done so by Health Canada. Once it is no longer required as evidence exhibits are destroyed by property officers and a detailed report is forwarded to Health Canada.

The Police Service's Firearms Log – Every firearm that has been either seized or surrendered in 2018, has been tracked and accounted for. Any firearms that were destroyed, are done so in accordance with the Police Services Act and the Policies and Procedures of the Smiths Falls Police Service. The Smiths Falls Police utilizes the Canadian Ammunition Disposal (C.A.D.S) company to destroy seized and surrendered firearms, ammunition and prohibited weapons and hard drives from computers. C.A.D.S. attended the police station in 2018 and all items listed above were destroyed from our property stores.

There were **718** items logged into property exhibits in 2018. At this time, all Property, Drugs and Firearms in the possession of the Smiths Falls Police Service are up to current standards.

COMMUNITY SERVICE

The year 2018 marks the 8th year the Smiths Falls Police Service has employed an officer in the position of a Community Service Officer. This position within the Police Service has proven to be effective, wanted and warranted in our community. By having a Community Service Officer in our community, it allows police and the community to work in conjunction with one another to become more involved in deterring and reducing criminal activity, as well as identifying and assisting those members of our community in need. This partnership also provides citizens more input into the quality of life in their community.

The Community Policing Model identifies a need to involve Community Partners with a common goal to assist in making the Community Safer and to target specific areas where there is an identifiable problem. The Community Service Officer does this by:

Being a member of various boards and groups including: The Intersections Program, Smiths Falls Municipal Drug Strategy Committee, Lanark County Municipal Drug Strategy Steering Committee, Police Coordinator for the Smiths Falls and District Crime Stoppers, Harm Reduction Committee, Human Services and Justice Coordinating Committee (Lanark County Mental Health), Youth at Risk (Lanark County Mental Health), Hoarding Coalition (Lanark County Mental Health), Local Immigrant Partnership, Lanark County Planning Counsel for Children, School Travel Planning Committee, Lanark County Situation Table, Emergency Crisis Response for School Bus drivers, Big Brothers Big Sisters After School Program, Youth Collective Impact in Lanark County, Child Youth Advocacy Center Steering Committee, Walking School Bus and The Trinity Church's "Warming Shelter" Steering Committee.

Community presentations/engagements: The following presentations were delivered to the public: Opioid Crisis and Fentanyl, Cannabis legalization laws, Human Trafficking, Bicycle and Pedestrian safety, Frauds against Seniors, Elder Abuse, Health IM Mental Health Screening Tool, and Internet and Social Media Safety to name a few. When presenting in the community the Community Services Officer partners with other community agencies to assist in delivering the theme/information. By showing these partnerships in our community, it reinforces the importance and unity in the messaging.

Media relations: The Community Service Officer has great partnerships with our local media outlets. With the use of social media, television and radio interviews, the Community Service Officer was able to keep the community updated on events, presentations and all other important messaging. In 2018, the Criminal Investigations Bureau (C.I.B) of the Smiths Falls Police Service was staffed by Detective Constable Brad Walker and Detective Constable Dave Rakobowchuk.

The C.I.B. is tasked with all major crime investigations, drug investigations and the gathering of intelligence. During the course of 2018, the C.I.B. investigated an array of criminal offences including robberies, serious assaults, large scale frauds and drug and weapons offences. As a result of these investigations the C.I.B. seized numerous illegal firearms, weapons and quantities of drugs during the course of 2018.

The Smiths Falls Police Service is also a contributing member of the Criminal Intelligence Service of Ontario (CISO). As a member of this organization, the Smiths Falls Police Service is required to attend regularly scheduled meetings and training held by the CISO. The Smiths Falls Police Service understands the importance of intelligence sharing in policing and the CISO offers a valuable forum for these dialogues to take place.

A member of the police service assisted a member of the public with an inquiry regarding the behaviour of a police officer. The member of the public was vague in details but the information indicated that the member of the public may have knowledge of a historical incident regarding a sexual assault committed by a member of the Ontario Provincial Police.

The information was reported to the Ontario Provincial Police. The OPP notified the SIU and the SIU invoked their mandate. In November, 2018 the Smiths Falls Police Service member was designed as "witness officer" and certain reports and information were required by the SIU.

The investigation is continuing at this time.

In September, 2018 the SIU investigation from August, 2017 where three members of the Smiths Falls Police Service were designated as "witness officers" was concluded. The Smiths Falls Police members were advised of the outcome of the investigation.

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
